Finger Gym and Nursery Rhymes

Your children may have shared with you various nursery rhymes and finger gym rhymes we have been learning and carrying out daily. Next term we will be learning more finger gym rhymes and activities. Here is some information about Finger Gym.


Finger Gym

Finger Gym is a programme of developmental games, stories, rhymes, and activities to improve fine motor skills, language and eventually handwriting. It is a programme that can benefit children from 9 months to 9 years. It helps to develop strong, flexible fingers, hands, and arms. It promotes better hand-eye co-ordination, differentiated movement and manual dexterity. It fosters children's use and understanding of spoken language.

People realised a long time ago that the combination of poem or rhyme and movement positively influences a child's development. The oral tradition of any country provides examples of poems and rhymes accompanied by movements such as *Round and Round the Garden* etc. Later this folk wisdom was confirmed by scientific study. Studies carried out suggest that the development of fine motor skills creates the preconditions for many psychological processes, in particular speech and language development. Some work suggests that motor skills and speech develop in tandem, so when we stimulate fine motor development through hand and finger exercises, we positively influence the development of speech and language.

Fine motor control and hand-eye co-ordination take time and practise to develop. We can prepare children's hands for learning to write long before they have to pick up writing tools. When children start writing and drawing their fingers and hands must work as hard as a marathon runner's legs, so Finger Gym is going to help us get in training!

Over the holiday you can help children your children remember the names we have given the fingers. Perhaps at night-time they can say 'Goodnight Tommy Thumb, Goodnight Peter Pointer, Goodnight Toby Tall, Goodnight Ruby Ring, Goodnight Baby Small, Goodnight fingers all! (The children can isolate and wiggle each finger and then all fingers at the end).
