Rights Respecting Article 31 – ‘Every child has the right to play and rest.’ 		Comprehension – Demonstrate understanding of stories through verbal retelling, predict key events and use and apply new vocabulary learnt in different contexts. Understand 5 key concepts of print. Listen to daily stories to support understanding of key events. Word Reading – Use the ‘Read, Write, Inc’ scheme to start working on 16 initial sounds in our phonics (Set 1). Explore stories with a ‘people that help us’ theme. Share information books about topic, books from home, share stories, read stories, sing songs and rhymes. Writing – Opportunities for mark making inside and out. Use our phonic knowledge to sound out CVC words. Label pictures. Create labels in the environment, lists for tasks. Practise and secure name writing.		Week 1-3 Getting to Know You Key times of the day, class routines, positional language (where do things belong?). Informal baseline: Assess counting principles, one to one, stable order, cardinal, abstraction, order irrelevance. Week 4-5 Match, Sort and Compare Match objects, match pictures and objects, identify a set, sort objects to a type, explore sorting techniques, create sorting rules and compare amounts. Week 6-7 Talk About Measure and Patterns Compare size, compare mass, compare capacity, explore simple patterns, copy and continue simple patterns and create simple patterns. Week 8 It's Me 1, 2, 3 Find 1, 2 and 3, subitise 1, 2 and 3, represent 1, 2 and 3, 1 more, 1 less and composition of 1, 2 and 3.
